







The same instructor teaches ENG 111 & ALP 002.

Traditional ENG 002

- Focus on writing discrete paragraphs
- Writing assignments based on the rhetorical modes
- Typically 6 paragraphs & 1 thesis-driven essay
- No clear alignment with ENG 111
- No professional development for faculty

ALP ENG 002

- Focus on reinforcing the writing process
- Assignments provide scaffolding for ENG 111 assignments
- Challenging prompts
- Focus on strengthening students' non-cognitive skills
- ALP faculty form a community & receive support

Philosophy

Backwards design
High expectations
Targeted student
support
Just-in-time
remediation

Grading

Assignments & weights not predetermined
Students must earn 70% of the points


Select one poem that deals with the experience of being excluded. Write an essay that answers ALL of the following questions:


- 1. In the poem that you have selected, on what basis has the speaker been excluded, and how does the poem portray that exclusion?
- 2. How does the speaker respond to being excluded? What response does the poem encourage, explicitly or implicitly?
- 3. Given the historical context of the poem, what are the advantages and disadvantages of that response?


Claude McKay's poem "America" presents the speaker's response to being excluded from mainstream American society. After talking with your peers and reviewing your notes from ENG 111, write a paragraph that responds to the following prompt:

How does the speaker of "America" characterize his relationship with America, and how does he respond to his exclusion?

Your paragraph should include evidence (direct quotes) from the poem to support your claims.
