- II. Course Objectives (learning outcomes)
 - A. Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:
 - 1. Employ a generative and recursive writing process that includes invention, planning, drafting, revising, editing and proofreading.

- 2. Develop related paragraphs on an assigned topic.
- 3. Write for a variety of specific audiences.
- 4. Write clear sentences that are varied in structure and length.
- 5. Write effective, focused, and logically organized paragraphs.
- 6. Use effective transitions within and between paragraphs.
- 7. Write coherent essays of five or more paragraphs, as appropriate to topic, audience and purpose.
- 8. Work collaboratively with peers in the development and revision of an essay.
- 9. Identify and correct major sentence-level errors (especially sentence fragments, comma-spliced and run-on sentences, subject-verb disagreement, and incorrect verb tense and form) in their writing.
- 10. Identify and correct minor sentence-level errors (including apostrophes, punctuation, pronoun reference and agreement and capitalization) in their writing

III. Course Requirements and Policies:

A. Requirements

- 1. Submit a diagnostic writing sample during the first week of class.
- 2. Successful completion of assigned class, lab and homework assignments. (All course work must be completed by the last day or class for credit.)

<u>Writers' Workshops</u>: Before each writing assignment is due, you will have the opportunity and responsibility to share your writing with classmates in order to give and receive feedback. *Attendance and preparedness at Writers' Workshops is required.

The grading process for individual writing assignments is as follows:

<u>Rough Draft</u> will be reviewed by your classmates during a Writers' Workshop. <u>Final Draft</u> (must be typed) is submitted for a grade. <u>Revised Draft</u> with completed revisions and edits is submitted. Revision is required for all assignments that receive a grade below 70 points. This is the last opportunity to earn a passing grade for an assignment.

Final Grade: Your final grade will either be Satisfactory (S) or Unsatisfactory (U).

"S" Satisfactory for an average of 70% or higher (350 points out of 500 or above). **"U**" Unsatisfactory for an average below 70% (349 points and below).

- C. Attendance: Attendance and participation are necessary for the successful completion of this course. For this course, you may have a maximum of six absences. If class must be missed for any reason, the student should inform the instructor of the reason for the absence, preferably before the class is missed. Missed class work must be made up by the second class following the absence. After that, late work will not be accepted. More than six absences will result in a grade of Unsatisfactory for the course.
- D. <u>Lateness</u>: Lateness of 20 minutes or leaving class 20 minutes early may be counted as a class absence. Grammar quizzes will be administered during the first 10 minutes of class. A missed quiz will result in an automatic deduction of 5 points; however, no penalty will be assessed if the student has documentation to excuse his/her lateness or absence.
